

First-Time First-Year Admission Trends 2014-2017:



First-time, Full-Time Undergraduate Students: BY ETHNICITY



MAJOR SELECTED BY First-Time, First-Year Students




ENROLLMENT BY MAJOR: 2015-2016 & 2016-2017






RETENTION RATE Trend 2012-2016


