**Dr. Cynthia (Taylor) Anthony '84,** the first woman to be named president of Lawson State Community College, says Talladega College provided a foundation for both her professional and personal success.

engagement, and service in a global society," Dr. Anthony stated. "The faculty and staff were committed and dedicated to student success. In a field noted for its shortage of both female and African-American practitioners, **Ms. Essye B. Miller**'85 blazed a vibrant trail as a member of the government's elite Senior Executive Service and the Principal Deputy, Department of Defense Chief Information Officer (DoD CIO). Her generous contributions to Talladega College include funding a new cybersecurity center, which is now being established on campus.

McNair Scholar Che'Isha Johnson has been selected to participate in the National Science Foundation funded



REU (Research Experience for Undergraduates) program at the internationally known Dauphin Island Sea Lab.

"Students from across the nation apply for this program, and only a few are selected each year. This is definitely a prestigious honor, and we're thrilled that Ms. Johnson was selected to participate," said Assistant Biology Professor Dr. Andrew Coleman.

Che'Isha, a sophomore majoring in biology, will spend the summer researching sea life. Before applying for the research opportunity, she visited Dauphin Island with the McNair program.

"I saw how they conduct research, and I was inspired. Many people are interested in space, but don't really think about what's happening in the oceans. We need to think about the impact of pollution on animals and investigate how we can protect and heal sea animals," said Che'Isha.

Che'Isha is a Provost Scholarship recipient, a member of the Pre-Med Honor Society, and vice president of the Talladega College colony of Gamma Sigma Sigma.

She has been highlighted in magazines and newspapers and interviewed on television and radio. Her inspiring messages have encouraged and motivated students at Talladega and other Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) during these uncertain times.

"People thank me for inspiring them and praise me for my effort. It's very fulfilling to know that I'm making a difference," said Patria, who graduates in May 2021.

Patria was recently inducted into Beta Beta Beta (Tri Beta) Honor Society. She was also selected for membership in Omicron Delta Kappa, a premier national leadership honor society. In addition, she is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.

This hard-working biology major has excelled academically, represented impeccably, and successfully juggled a plethora of leadership responsibilities despite the pandemic.

Alumnus Seddrick T. Hill Sr. '06 has been named city manager for Talladega, Alabama. The city council voted unanimously for Mr. Hill, who previously served as executive director for the Alabama Institute for Deaf and Blind (AIDB) Office of Institutional Advancement. Dr. Kristie L. Kenney, Talladega College's vice president for institutional advancement, has been selected to participate in the Millennium Leadership Initiative (MLI). A new class of 32 exemplary, senior-level higher education professionals will participate in the 2021 MLI, a premier leadership development program of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU).

"I commend Dr. Kenney for being one of only 32 higher education professionals in the nation selected to participate in the 2021 Millennium Leadership Initiative," said Talladega College President Dr. Billy C. Hawkins, who was a member of the 2000 MLI. "Having completed MLI, I understand and appreciate the value and lasting impact that this program can have on a participant's life."

In 2020, AASCU restructured MLI in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The 2021 institute will feature virtual programming—four meetings a month from March 17 to May 26. Additionally, it includes a tentative, in-person meeting in the fall. Protégés will also have a yearlong mentorship with an experienced president or chancellor and four months of professional coaching from a retired president or chancellor.

#### FIRST FEMALE CHIEF

Talladega College recently named **Shajuana L. Dennard** its new Chief/ Director of Campus Police.

"Chief Dennard is the first female to ever hold this position at Talladega College, and she is one of only a handful of females in our nation to rise to this level," said Talladega College President Dr. Billy C. Hawkins. "She earned this position because of her exceptional knowledge, training, experience, and skills."

Chief Dennard worked for the Birmingham Police Department (BPD) for approximately 4 years. During her tenure with BPD, she interfaced with the Birmingham Narcotics Unit and Alabama ABC Board to reduce illegal alcohol and drug sales. She later joined a joint task force which allowed her to work with federal agents, including U.S. Marshals, ATF (Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives), and DEA (United States Drug Enforcement Administration).



## **NASA SCIENTIST**

**Dr. Alvin Smith '01**, manager of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory (NASA JPL) Planetary Protection Center of Excellence and Backward Planetary Protection Lead for Mars Sample Return, credits Talladega College for providing the foundation that helped him excel in science.

"Talladega College really shaped my first understanding of the scientist, individually and collectively, that I wanted to become. The sense of family and community fostered a sense of belonging you rarely find these days, rooted in historical black excellence," Dr. Smith stated. "It was this TC community that made the first investment, through scholarships and didactic scientific education, that truly launched my ambitions to the stars."

Dr. Smith joined JPL after spending over 16 years in consulting as a biodefense subject matter expert (SME) and researcher in high containment labs. He holds a B.S. in biology from Talladega College and a Ph.D. in microbiology from Howard University.



#### AWARD-WINNING SCIENTIST

Chemistry Department Chair/Assistant Professor **Dr. Pamela Brady** has been named one of the 1,000 Inspiring Black Scientists in America. This prestigious list, compiled by *Cell Mentor*, highlights the important contributions that Black scientists make to the scientific community.

Dr. Brady earned her bachelor's in chemistry/pre-med with minors in both mathematics and Spanish at Winston-Salem State University in 2008. She completed her doctoral degree in analytical chemistry at Louisiana State University in 2015.

She also completed a National Institutes of Health funded Institutional Research and Academic Career Development Awards (IRACDA) postdoctoral fellowship at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Her work at UAB involved investigating the structure function relationship of coronaviral proteins using multidimensional NMR spectroscopy. She also gained valuable teaching experience and earned Center for the Integration of Research, Teaching, and Learning (CIRTL) certifications.

The **Detroit Talladega College Club** (**DTCC**) sponsored a virtual Black History Month fundraiser featuring "Amistad," the 1997 Academy Award nominated film directed by Steven Spielberg. The event was moderated by Pulitzer Prize winner Rochelle Riley and award-winning author and poet Nikky Finney '79. Participants included: Co-Founder President/CEO of The National Great Blacks in Wax Museum Dr. Joanne Martin; High Museum of Art curator Stephanie Heydt; retired judge Houston Brown '65; DTCC President Dr. Eugene L. Cain '65; retired attorney J. Mason Davis '56; Chief Curator of the National Museum of African American History and Culture Dr. Jacquelyn Serwer; performer Tammy Denease; and Talladega College senior James Yeager.

Pre and post movie discussions focused on the conditions of the African captives on the Amistad, the trial, and facts and omissions not covered in the film. In addition, the program included an artistic presentation and panel discussions regarding the renowned Amistad Murals.
